WORD AND PRAYER

FIRST READING: Ezekiel 18.1-4, 25-32

The prophet Ezekiel testifies: Then another message came to me from the Lord: ² "Why do you quote this proverb concerning the land of Israel: 'The parents have eaten sour grapes, but their children's mouths pucker at the taste'? ³ As surely as I live, says the Sovereign Lord, you won't quote this proverb anymore in Israel. ⁴ For all people are Mine to judge—both parents and children alike. And this is My rule: The person who sins is the one who'll die…

²⁵ "Yet you say, 'The Lord isn't doing what's right!' Listen to Me, O people of Israel. Am *I* the One not doing what's right, or is it *you*? ²⁶ When righteous people turn from their righteous behavior and start doing sinful things, they'll die for it. Yes, they'll die because of their sinful deeds. ²⁷ And if wicked people turn from their wickedness, obey the law, and do what's just and right, they'll save their lives. ²⁸ They'll live because they thought it over and decided to turn from their sins. Such people won't die. ²⁹ And yet the people of Israel keep saying, 'The Lord isn't doing what's right!' O people of Israel, it's *you* who aren't doing what's right, not I!

³⁰ "Therefore, I'll judge each of you, O people of Israel, according to your actions, says the Sovereign Lord. Repent and turn from your sins. Don't let them destroy you! ³¹ Put all your rebellion behind you and find yourselves a new heart and a new spirit. For why should you die, O people of Israel? ³² I don't want you to die, says the Sovereign Lord. Turn back and live!"

This is holy wisdom; this is holy word.

SECOND READING: Philippians 2.1-13

St Paul writes: Is there any encouragement from belonging to Christ? Any comfort from His love? Any fellowship together in the Spirit? Are your hearts tender and compassionate? ² Then make me truly happy by agreeing wholeheartedly with each other, loving one another, and working together with one mind and purpose. ³ Don't be selfish; don't try to impress others. Be humble, thinking of others as better than yourselves. ⁴ Don't look out only for your own interests, but take an interest in others, too. ⁵ You must have the same attitude that Christ Jesus had:

- ⁶ Though He was God, He didn't think of equality with God as something to cling to.
- ⁷ Instead, He gave up His divine privileges;
- He took the humble position of a slave and was born as a human being.
- When He appeared in human form,
- ⁸ He humbled himself in obedience to God and died a criminal's death on a cross.
- ⁹ Therefore, God elevated Him to the place of highest honor and gave him the name above all other names,
- ¹⁰ that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth,
- ¹¹ and every tongue declare that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

¹² Dear friends, you always followed my instructions when I was with you. And now that I'm away, it's even more important. Work hard to show the results of your salvation, obeying God with deep reverence and fear. ¹³ For God's working in you, giving you the desire and the power to do what pleases Him.

The Holy Gospel according to St Matthew, the 21st chapter.

Glory to You, O Lord!

²³ When Jesus returned to the Temple and began teaching, the leading priests and elders came up to Him. They demanded, "By what authority are You doing all these things? Who gave You the right?"

²⁴ "I'll tell you by what authority I do these things if you answer one question," Jesus replied. ²⁵ "Did John's authority to baptize come from heaven, or was it merely human?"

They talked it over among themselves. "If we say it was from heaven, He'll ask us why we didn't believe John. ²⁶ But if we say it was merely human, we'll be mobbed because the people believe John was a prophet." ²⁷ So they finally replied, "We don't know."

And Jesus responded, "Then I won't tell you by what authority I do these things.

²⁸ "But what do you think about this? A man with two sons told the older boy, 'Son, go out and work in the vineyard today.' ²⁹ The son answered, 'No, I won't go'— but later he changed his mind and went anyway. ³⁰ Then the father told the other son, 'You go,' and he said, 'Yes, sir, I will'— but he didn't go. ³¹ Which of the two obeyed his father?"

They replied, "The first."

Then Jesus explained His meaning: "I tell you the truth, corrupt tax collectors and prostitutes will get into the Kingdom of God before you do. ³² For John the Baptist came and showed you the right way to live, but you didn't believe him, while tax collectors and prostitutes did. And even when you saw this happening, you refused to believe him and repent of your sins.

This is the Gospel of our Lord.

The Heart of Obedience

"Which of the two did the will of his father?" Jesus asks in His parable today. Cutting through all the ethical fog the teachers of the Law could muster to complicate the question, Jesus gets straight to the point: "Which one of the two *obeyed his father?*"

Let's face it: "Obedience" is a dirty word in our society. We're raised to be *consumers*— to hold others accountable to our desires, demands, and agendas. We're even consumers when it comes to God, truth be told. We expect our God and our churches to give us what we want, to make us feel good and affirm the priority and importance of our own lives; so often, our first priority is "personal empowerment". But obedience implies that we answer to someone else besides ourselves, that we're *not* our own masters— and that's where we balk!

But in our first reading, we hear Ezekiel voicing God's word of pleading confrontation to His people: "Repent and turn from all your transgressions; otherwise iniquity will be your ruin... Why will you die, O house of Israel? For I have no pleasure in the death of anyone... Turn, then, and live!"

So how shall God get our attention and win our obedience— the obedience in which we might know life?

Well, one way is "the rule of law", secured by superior power, compulsion, violence, and call of duty: "Do this or else!" We assume the rule of law is rooted in some sort of transcendent justice; but ultimately, the rule of law is rooted in power and driven by fear— but fear only isolates us more!

Obedience doesn't begin with rules... Obedience doesn't even begin with the power or authority of the one making the rules... Obedience begins with a heart yielded to God in trust— a yielding made possible by God's grace and love! Ezekiel points us to this other way: "Cast away from you all the transgressions that you've committed against Me, and get yourselves a new heart and a new spirit!" And Martin Luther, in his Small Catechism, prefaces his explanation of each of the Ten Commandments with "We're to revere, love, and trust God above everything else... We're to revere and love God so that we don't... but rather..."

So why is repentance so often the hardest for the ones who seem the most zealous to live a righteous life? Why would the notoriously sinful get into the Reign of God ahead of the priests and religious? New Testament scholar William Loader suggests, "Is it because [the notoriously sinful] allowed themselves to be vulnerable, to be moved, to let the word of [God's] compelling compassion address their deeper needs? Were the religious leaders so defensive in protecting their system— in the name of the people of God and the Scriptures— that they suppressed their own inner cries and stopped their ears?"

Real obedience requires not a new law, but a new *heart*— the heart of Christ Jesus! The real obedience of a new heart is born of God's grace, rather than duty or fear— knowing that God's way of doing things is unto our blessing, not our deprivation. It's God's grace that leads us to repentance— the yielding of ourselves to *God's* ownership and agendas. The apostle Paul uses an ancient hymn to point us to Christ Jesus as the ultimate example of this self-yielding; in Philippians 2, he calls us to embody Jesus' "kenosis", not exploiting even equality with God as something to be exploited for our own benefit, but emptying ourselves for the sake of others. And one of Luther's prayers bespeaks this well: "Take what I have, that I may have You. Melt and consume me, that we may be one. For Your goodness is stronger than my sins; Your life is stronger than my death. For me, You are life itself! Let my death vanish in Your life, my sins in Your goodness, my guilt in Your mercy." Day after day, we die to ourselves and our own agendas, letting go of our own power that we may be empowered by trusting in God's love and grace. And empowered by God's grace, we go on to live our lives not turned in on ourselves, but directed outward toward God and others to build them up.

And what's the fruit of this sort of obedient heart? *Joy*— greater pleasure from giving than from receiving, from blessing others rather than soaking up blessing from others! As Jesus said to His disciples in John 15, "I've told you this so my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete". In the end, you see, God's pleadings with His people of every age— God's pleadings with *us*— aren't ultimately the stuff of divine exasperation or stern warnings of hellfire after all, but an invitation to joy— joy in the yielding, the eternal joy of Christ Himself! "For the joy set before Him *Christ Jesus* endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God" [Heb 12.2]. Turn, then, and live!

"Yes" and "No"

"Yes" and "no"— how incredibly important those two little words are! Contracts and corporations, marriages and multinational business deals all hinge on the power of those two words. But our "yes" is only as good as our "no". "Yes" makes sense only if there's a "no". "Yes" and "no" divide reality into mutually exclusive options, and the line between them is the crucial element that gives meaning to both terms.


Jesus' parable of the two brothers points out that we answer "yes" and "no" with our actions as well as with words. We can say "yes" with our mouths but live a "no"; conversely, a person might say "no", but in the end discover that she's lived a "yes".

The chief priests and teachers of the Law wanted to use words to trap Jesus with embarrassing questions. Jesus can play that word game, too. But Jesus does more than speak with authority—He lives it! He places His entire life behind His words, walking the path of obedience to His cross and through His own tomb. His "yes" and "no" can be poured into a chalice, broken as bread, authenticated in a cross and empty tomb...

The Church also needs to consider how and if our actions affirm what our words say. What will your community of faith need to do this week in order to authenticate the words you together speak in the liturgy? Will those who live around us experience our "yes" as a genuine "yes" and our "no" as "no"? How will we live the Creed, the readings, and the Eucharist? How can the words of our preaching set the stage and challenge God's people to embody Christ's life-giving word this coming week?


