Welcome to our worship of the Lord Jesus Christ on this Second Sunday in Lent! The second covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the one God made with Abraham and Sarah to make them the ancestors of many, with whom God will remain in everlasting covenant. Paul says this promise comes to all who share Abraham's faith in the God who brings life into being where there was no life. We receive this baptismal promise of resurrection life in faith. Sarah and Abraham receive new names as a sign of the covenant, and we too get new identities in Baptism, as we put on Christ.

God hears us when we cry, and draws us close in Christ Jesus. So let's return to the One who's full of compassion:

Silence is kept for individual reflection and confession. After the period of silence, we sing (see p. 13 for the music):

O Lord who rules the heav'nly hosts, O God of Abraham, Lord God of Isaac, Jacob, and of all their chosen clan; You made the heav'ns and formed the earth with all their vast array; Before You all things quake with fear and tremble in dismay.

But yet Your love surpasses all the measure of our mind; You, Lord, are patient, merciful, and infinitely kind. You do not judge as we deserve; in Your great goodness, Lord, You offer pardon that we may repent and be restored.

And now, O Lord, I bend my knee and make my sure appeal, For I have sinned, Lord, and I know my wickedness too well. Therefore I make this prayer to You: Forgive me, Lord, forgive; Let me not perish in my sin, let me not die, but live.

Those who repent have You as God; in me Your love is shown; I, though unworthy, shall be saved; thus is Your love made known! I will praise You unceasingly, now and through all my days. The pow'rs of heaven sing Your praise-- glory is Yours always!

FIRST READING: Genesis 17.1-7, 15-16

¹When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the Lord appeared to Abram and said to him, "I'm God Almighty; walk before Me, and be blameless. ²And I'll make My covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous."

³Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, ⁴"As for Me, this is My covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁵No longer shall your name be 'Abram'— but your name shall be Abraham, for I've made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁶I'll make you exceedingly fruitful; and I'll make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. ⁷I'll establish My covenant between Me and you and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you"... ¹⁵God said to Abraham, "As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her 'Sarai', but Sarah shall be her name. ¹⁶I'll bless her, and moreover, I'll give you a son by her. I'll bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her."

SECOND READING: Romans 4.13-25

NLT

St Paul writes: ¹³God's promise that he'd inherit the world didn't come to Abraham or to his descendants through the Law, but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it's the adherents of the Law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath— but where there's no law, neither is there violation.

¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that *God's* promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all *Abraham's* descendants— not only to the adherents of the Law, but also to those who share the faith of Abraham. For he's the father of all of us (¹⁷as it's written, "I've made you the father of many nations") in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that don't exist. ¹⁸Hoping against hope, *Abraham* believed that he'd become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." ¹⁹He didn't weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. ²⁰No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, ²¹being fully convinced that God was able to do what He'd promised. ²²Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." ²³Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, ²⁴but for ours also. It'll be reckoned to us who believe in Him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, ²⁵who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

THE HOLY GOSPEL: Mark 8.31-38

Sung to the tune of "In the Cross of Christ I Glory":

We are turning, Lord, to hear You; You are merciful and kind, Slow to anger, rich in blessing, and with love to us inclined.

The Holy Gospel according to St Mark, the first chapter. *Glory to You, O Lord!*

After Peter confessed his belief that Jesus is the Messiah, ³¹Jesus began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. ³²He said all this quite openly. And Peter took Him aside and began to rebuke Him. ³³But turning and looking at His disciples, He rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind Me, Satan— for you're setting your mind not on divine things, but on human things." *Then* ³⁴He called the crowd with His disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become My followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow Me. ³⁵For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for My sake and for the sake of the Gospel will save it. ³⁶For what'll it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? ³⁷Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? ³⁸Those who are ashamed of Me and of My words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when He comes in the glory of His Father with the holy angels."

This is the Gospel of our Lord.

Accompany those who suffer in body, mind, or spirit; restore those who are sick or grieving; watch over those who've left their homes or families in search of safety or employment; bring vindication to victims of injustice, exploitation, and oppression; and help all Your broken ones to discover for themselves the beauty You see in them. We especially seek Your healing grace for our brothers and sisters... and all whom we remember before You now...

As we await the day of Christ's final appearing in glory, lead us by the example of all the saints whom You've called to take up their cross and follow You, that together we may find our lives in You.

For into Your hands, O God, we commend ourselves and all for whom we pray, trusting in Your mercy through Christ Jesus our Lord.

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After the Confession

You tried to explain it to your brother once, and to yourself, the sense you've had growing within you since that day Jesus called you to follow, and you did that sense of awe, of something forcing cracks into familiar walls of thought, like that time as a child when you first saw the sea, not the Galilean waters from which your family fished, but the Mediterranean, vast, blue, the deep waves rolling in, the ships sailing out, their square sails growing small as they headed to the horizon from which the wind blew a salt scent to your skin, while your thoughts tried to grasp something big beyond words . . . and today here's Jesus, asking what people have been naming Him, and you use the word that comes so easily to your lips, it slips like breathing from your mouth: "Messiah" yet you sense as you say it that you're trying to name the sea, but describing just the beginning of an ocean of truth; and sure enough: Jesus speaks about suffering death almost as if it were part of a plan, which surely can't be, but He rebukes your rebuke of Him, talks of taking up a cross, of losing life to find it suddenly you're again that young child on the shore, watching a boat leave harbor on a deeper sea than you've ever known— and somehow the ship that's leaning into the wind has its deck underneath your own feet...

The Audacity of It!

Longtime improv comedy teacher Billy Merritt claims there are three types of improvisers: the pirate, the straight man or woman, and the ninja. The pirate's the one we think of when we imagine an improviser: the zany one, fearless and unpredictable, willing to do or say anything in order to get a scene going. John Belushi at his finest was a pirate...

When I lead improv workshops for church groups, I like to ask, "Who was Jesus' best pirate?" Many groups answer instantly, with one voice: "Peter". Peter's always full of grand gestures. When Peter sees Jesus transfigured on the mountain, he wants to go right to work building dwellings so they can stay up there and bask in that wonderful feeling. When he tries to rebuff Jesus for washing his feet and Jesus chastises him, he changes his tune: "OK, Jesus, wash my whole body instead!" And when the disciples are fishing together after the resurrection and see Jesus standing on the beach, we know which one jumps into the water and swims in to meet him, rather than just taking the boat ashore...

That go-for-broke attitude traces back to today's passage. Immediately prior to this, Jesus has asked, "Who do you say that I am?" and Peter responds, "The Messiah!" Barely three verses later, Peter is rebuking Him— rebuking the Messiah! Jesus is having none of it ("Get behind Me, Satan!"); though notably, He doesn't blanch at the fact of the pushback so much as the content: "You're setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

I have to admire Peter's sheer audacity to argue with— to reproach, even— the person he only moments ago identified as the Anointed One for whom countless generations have been waiting and yearning. That takes nerve! I'm reminded of the meme that floats around the ultrarunning community: "Courage is knowing it might hurt and doing it anyway. Stupidity is the same thing. And that's why life is hard."

We can't blame Peter too much for being confused. Good teaching relies on a combination of showing and telling, and up to now, Jesus has been engaged in a lot of showing: feeding 5000 people, walking on water, healing the sick. Even the teachings of Jesus to this point have been focused on parables, with little about who Jesus is or His explicit mission. I'm reminded of a preaching professor who'd try to help her students rely more on showing than telling. I absorbed the lesson so zealously that my early sermons became beautiful but impenetrable works of poetry-prose. I remember one bit of written feedback: "Yes, we want to show people the mysteries of the Gospel more than tell them. But sometimes, MaryAnn, you just need to *SAYIT*." (Yes, she used all caps!)

Here, Jesus *SAYS IT*, laying out the path for those who'd follow Him. It's a familiar call to discipleship, repeated in one form or another in each Gospel. But the four accounts differ. According to Matthew, Jesus assures us that those who lose their life will "find" it (10:39). Luke says we will "keep" it (17:33), and John says we'll "keep it for eternal life" (12:25).

Mark's Jesus goes a step further. He's not a "finders-keepers" kind of guy. Our lives aren't simply misplaced items needing to be retrieved; nor are they things to be preserved, whether now or in the life to come. For Mark's Jesus, we're hopelessly lost without God, and when we lose our life for Christ, we'll actually save it. We'll be rescued from grave danger and harsh afflictions, delivered from the very throes of death. Spirituality's not something we dabble in for personal enlightenment; for Christians, a relationship with Jesus Christ is a matter of life and death.

"Why is it that every Christian sanctuary has His cross at the focal point," asks pastor Paul Shupe, "while our own crosses are nowhere symbolized?" If we're honest, many of us really don't want this kind of saving. We'd like to continue living as we currently do, just happier— more faithfully would be fine, so long as we stay comfortable. We'd rather not be transformed, but we're willing to be improved. We're not sure about being saved, but enhanced? Yes, please...

In her book <u>How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going</u>, Susan Beaumont writes about a member of her home church, Anna B. Quick, who through her steadfastness kept the small congregation afloat during long periods without a pastor a century ago. Every Sunday she'd come to the rundown church building, unlock the doors, turn on the lights, and keep vigil in the sanctuary just in case someone showed up. She filed the annual paperwork to keep the church a legal entity. Over time, conditions changed, and the church began to thrive again...


At least, that's how the story was told. When a recent pastor dug into the details, he discovered that things changed only after Quick and a few others started giving boldly and sacrificially of their time and money to hire a pastor, tear down the old building, and raise money for a new facility and new ministries. Quick and others denied themselves, took up their cross, and followed where it led— not to some remote mission field, but to a profound offering of self in the name of following Jesus.

"Now's no time for an academic solidarity with the world," writes Richard Rohr. "Real solidarity needs to be felt and suffered. That's the real meaning of the word 'suffer'— to allow someone else's pain to influence us in a real way. We need to move beyond our own personal feelings and take in the whole." Self-improvement has its place, but Jesus promises us something much deeper, if we're willing to give ourselves to it.


